### **New Clothes and Linens: Wash First**

Wearing a brand-new outfit that is neat and crisp can be very satisfying. The same goes for having brightly colored towels or sheets that are not faded or frayed. But as much as we want to preserve the "like new" appearance of our clothing and linens, it's **best to wash new items before wearing or using.** Follow the care labels for best results. Keep an eye out for phrases like, "wash before wearing," or "wash before use."

Much of our clothing and linens (sheets and towels) arrive with **finishes or chemicals on them that may cause skin irritation or bother allergies.** These fabric treatments are usually applied to ease the manufacturing process, prevent damage during storage or shipment, or they may be related to the fabric dye or performance features. Although some finishes (such as "non-iron" or "water-repellant") are meant to remain on fabrics after repeated washings, **washing new items ensures excess residue is removed.** 

Washing new clothes also **eliminates dust, dirt, and germs** that may be present because of hanging out in stores or being tried on by other consumers. Washing first also helps **prevent dye-transfer.** This happens when color rubs off one item onto another. Ever wonder why your white socks turn blue when you wear new jeans? That's why! Care labels for **clothing that is brightly or deeply colored will usually suggest washing separately** for the first few washes.

Remember to **launder your linens before their first use, too.** Towels and sheets become **more absorbent and softer** after their first wash. For best washer and dryer efficiency, wash towels and sheets in separate loads. Don't use too much detergent. And keep things fresh in the washer by trying a quarter cup of white vinegar *instead of* liquid fabric softener.

What about "fancy" clothes or "dry-clean only" items? Sometimes it may not make sense to wash an item before wearing, and dry cleaning may not be an easy option. That's OK. **Do what works for your situation**. But keep in mind that buying new clothes, sheets, or towels simply because you don't feel like washing your dirty ones is not the best solution.

Dear Members,

Just wanted to keep you abreast of the latest happenings in the world of Kentucky Extension Homemakers (KEHA). Three new KEHA state officers and chairs were elected at the state meeting this year. President- Henrietta Sheffel, Breathitt County (was President-Elect); Secretary – Barbara Seiter, Boone County; 4-H Youth Development Educational Chairman – Peggy Tracy, Bourbon County; and Management and Safety Educational Chairman – Diana Morgan, Grant County.

Total attendance this year at the KEHA state meeting was 500, which is a new record. There were 106 first time attendees. Cultural arts entries totaled 741. Out of those 741 Meade County won ten blue ribbons. Congratulations to Pam Patterson, Pamela Hicks, and Geraldine Shanahan. Additionally, Meade County Extension Homemakers won 1<sup>st</sup> Place in the Kentucky Academy/Ghana Library donation; 2<sup>nd</sup> Place in the Contribution to Evans/Hansen/Weldon Scholarship; 2<sup>nd</sup> Place in Contribution to Homemaker Member Scholarship; and were listed in the Ovarian Cancer Awards with having over 100% donations. Thanks also go out to those who contributed quilt squares for the quilt square auction.

More than \$8,000 was raised to support designated projects through the basket raffle, silent auction, and quilt square auction. The basket raffle generated \$2,927.00 to help fund the 2026 KEHA Leadership Academy; the silent auction raised \$2,759.00 to benefit the 4-H Foundation and the 301 handmade quilt squares auction raised \$2,328.00 to help offset the cost of hosting the KEHA state meeting. A check in the amount of \$43,077.44 was presented this year to the UK Ovarian Cancer Research and Screening Program. There were over 30 workshops and eleven craft classes and there were training workshops for officers and educational chairmen provided at the state meeting. As you can see there was a lot of activity going on at the state meeting this year.

Your voting delegates this year were Virginia Smiley and Janet Hobbs. Geraldine Shanahan from the Garrett Extension Homemakers also attended the state meeting and was fortunate enough to have a one on one with Heather French Henry. If you do not remember, Heather French Henry, won the title of Miss America in 2000. Not only has she competed as a beauty queen, but she is known for her talents as an American fashion designer, politician, and veteran's advocate. Being the gracious lady that she is she gave Geraldine something to talk about by allowing her to wear her Miss America crown for a few minutes of glory as can be seen in the picture of Ms. Henry and Geraldine. Way to go Geraldine!

Please make note of next year's KEHA state meeting which will take place May 12-14, 2026, at the Hyatt regency in Lexington, KY.

As a matter of information in case any of you may be interested, the 4-H International Exchange Committee needs more Host Families for incoming youth and chaperones. For every family recruited from the county, they will give the county \$100 for educational programming. Each county may send three to five names of possible Host Families. Applications are to be submitted as soon as possible. The young people (ages 13-18) and chaperones are coming from Taiwan, Korea, and Japan. They are coming to experience American culture as part of a family. They will stay from Taiwan from July 3 – August 2 and from Japan and Korea from July 21 – August 16. The KEHA year ends on June 30. Please remember that the due date for club reports, to include both educational program of work and volunteer service logs are due to the Meade County Extension Office no later than July 1.

I look forward to seeing everyone at our Meade County Extension Homemaker Annual Meeting on June 17. Remember each club is responsible for a donation of a theme basket with a raffle value of a minimum of \$35. Proceeds from the raffle baskets will go toward the Backpack Program so please be generous. Also, each member should bring a covered dish to feed 8-10 people. The Meade County Extension Homemaker Council will provide meat and bread. Please fulfill your club duties as assigned in conjunction with this event.

After our annual county meeting our next big event will be the Meade County Fair. It is hard to believe we are already preparing for the county fair. Please take note of your club's assigned host times at the fair during the week of July 21 – July 27 and if you are volunteering as a supervisor in a particular location in the Home and Garden building please arrive and be ready to start taking entries by 7:00 a.m.







## Summer Veggie & Wild Rice Bake

1 (6 ounce box) wild rice with herbs and seasoning

1 tablespoon olive oil

- 1 medium eggplant, peeled and diced
- 2 yellow squash, cut lengthwise, sliced crosswise

1 green pepper, chopped 1 medium onion,

chopped **6 cloves** garlic, minced

**3-5** tomatoes, coarsely chopped

½ cup coarsely chopped fresh basil

2 teaspoons salt 1 teaspoon pepper

1 cup low fat shredded Italian

cheese blend

Heat oven to 350 degrees F. Prepare wild rice in saucepan according to package directions. Remove from heat; drain excess water; stir in packet seasonings. Heat oil to medium high in large skillet. Add eggplant, squash, pepper and onion; stir and cook 5 minutes or until tender crisp. Stir in garlic and cook 1 minute. Add tomatoes, basil, salt and pepper; stir occasionally and cook 2 minutes until heated through. Stir in wild rice and spoon into a 9-by-13 inch baking dish

that has been coated with cooking spray. Top with cheese and cover with aluminum foil. Bake 35 minutes or until bubbly. Uncover and bake an additional 5 minutes.

Yield: 16

Serving Size: ½ cup
